BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE

Field experiences begin in the sophomore year, with service learning experiences in area schools. This continues into the junior year with a practicum in literacy. During their senior year, students complete a practicum experience in two chosen content areas. This is followed by a student teaching experience in two of the student's content areas in the subsequent semester.
