HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE

Field experiences begin sophomore year, with a service learning experience in an area school. This continues into the junior year, when students take a practicum in a student's chosen content area. During the senior year, students complete a second practicum experience, followed by a student teaching experience in the subsequent semester.
